Liz Munro

I was very taken with this play on the first reading and thought this is so funny yet so tragic - I just didn't get Judy at all and I related to everyone else who has various levels of frustration with her. She seems delusional and somewhat in denial about the impact her choice has on those closest to her, particularly her husband. I began to understand that Judy wants to create the type of home life she craved as a child but she ends up with a marriage that is a series of role plays and the more she holds on to this the more damage is wreaked on her relationships. There is a reckoning in the marriage as a number of confronting issues rise to the top and cannot be ignored.

Obviously the actors show this deterioration in their relationships as the play progresses but I had this crazy idea to represent this in the set as well. Some of the pieces around the home are larger than life and cartoonish - this is what Judy sees in her head - but the reality of these pieces is soon revealed as things deteriorate.


I also wanted the play to flow between scenes with no blackouts. As a result the characters go about their lives as the scenes transition. To make the necessary changes to the set I had to create a way for props to be changed in front of the audience so I hope you enjoy that innovation!

The music I chose helps to convey both emotion and the 50s era.

The audience is left wondering whether the marriage will last. Everyone will have their own view but a shaky compromise is reached and some of the 50s fantasy is dispelled - but for how long?

I do hope you enjoy my interpretation of this wonderfully written play and encourage you to form your own opinions about some of the issues raised.

The Playwright

Laura Wade was born in Bedford in 1970. She studied drama at Bristol University and was later a member of the Royal Court Theatre Young Writers' Program.

Her first play 'Limbo' was produced at the Sheffield Crucible Studio Theatre in 1996. Later plays include '16 Winters', an adaptation of W. H. Davies' 'Young Emma', 'Colder than Here', 'Breathing Corpses', 'Other Hands', 'Posh' (and its film adaptation 'The Riot Club',) Wade adapted Sarah Waters' novel 'Tipping the Velvet' into a stage play of the same name.

On 4 July 2018, Wade's play 'Home, I'm Darling' premiered at Theatr Clwyd. The play transferred to the National Theatre for a summer 2018 run, to the Duke of York's Theatre in January 2019, and later won Best Comedy at the 2019 Laurence Olivier Awards.

Synopsis

Johnny and Judy have agreed to live their home lives as if they were living in the 1950s - a simpler, more wholesome time where everyone knew their place. He earns the money and she stays home tending to the smooth running of the household. But how happy are the happily married?

Every couple needs a little fantasy to keep their marriage sparkling, but behind the vintage curtains and the freshly aired bedrooms, the fantasy is unraveling. Were the 50s as effortless and fabulous as Judy believes?

The situation reaches breaking point for the couple. Compromise is the art of any relationship ... but does that mean

nobody gets what they want? Can they make changes without breaking up?

Themes

- 1. Marriage as a series of role plays
- Creating a safe space to deal with a sad adolescence
- 3. Crippling obsession with nostalgia
- 4. Wearing a mask to conceal pain
- 5. The realities and fantasies of gender
- A challenge to rose tinted politics

Kelsey Hunter

In her 34 years, Kelsey has performed in countless productions, including Kathy in '9 to 5: The Musical' (Dolly Parton) Gosford Musical Society 2023, Carmen in 'Managing Carmen' (David Williamson) Lane Cove Theatre Society 2019, and Carol in 'Catch Me If You Can' (Terrence McNally) Berowra Musical Society 2019.

Despite her eccentricities, Judy is, at her heart, someone who only yearns to be loved. Kelsey hopes the audience can learn to love Judy as she traverses emotions and themes which are universally felt and experienced.

Prior to this play, Kelsey's only reference point for the 50s was Elvis. Her parents have joked that her 'theme song' is 'Devil in Disguise'. Thanks, Dad.

Kelsey is on 'cloud 9' to be involved in this 'swell' production, bringing the 'Nifty Fifties' to life once more. She hopes her husband forgives her for the on-stage 'necking'!

I have a diverse background in the performing arts, with experience in both musical theatre and traditional theatre productions. Performance History: Johnny in 'American Idiot' (Jopuka / Red Tree Theatre), Herr Zeller in 'Sound Of Music' (Red Tree Theatre), Mr Cocker in 'Back to the 80s' (Chookas Entertainment), Nick, Justin & Zac in 'Cosi' (Jopuka), Alex in 'End Of The Line' (Wyong Drama Group).

'Home I'm Darling' by Laura Wade is Madison's first foray into theatre at Wyong Drama Group. Madi has been involved in 14 productions with Macquarie University's Theatre Society, Dramac, and the musical society, MacMS, since 2022, including playing Rosencrantz in 'Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead' (2022) by Tom Stoppard, Cecily Cardew in 'The Importance of Being Earnest' (2023) by Oscar Wilde and Miranda in 'The Tempest' (2023) by William Shakespeare.

Given that prior to the show Madi's main exposure to the fifties was music and 'Happy Days', getting to see how the facade of the fifties and the reality of it for women has changed has been an informative experience. 
